Subject Parachute training				
Hi Domingos,				
You wanted to know what life is like at the Parachuting School, so let me tell you a bit about it.				
Before we jump from an aircraft , we do a lot of training on the ground. For example, we learn how to exit and how to land safely in a parachute landing fall . When we start practising aircraft jumps, we have to be careful of wind drift , which can take us away from the drop zone (DZ) . Another problem we learn to solve is parachute malfunctions .				
In the Australian Defence Force (ADF), we have static line training at an altitude between 800 feet and 1,000 feet. Paratroopers train on different types of parachute, including a reserve parachute .				
Then there is free fall training. In this type of training, we jump from an aircraft from up to 12,000 feet. This is called High Altitude Parachute Operations (HAPO) . Also, we sometimes jump from aircraft up to 25,000 feet.				
We work with riggers . They are the people who prepare the parachutes. Riggers also do parachute training.				
I hope this gives you an idea of parachute training. Call me if you want more information. Good luck in your training!	n
