Lesson: An Officer's Biography - Listening

TEACHER'S COPY

Overview:

This lesson practises listening in the context of a military member's biography and related vocabulary of military service. (tell ss that the word biography is often shortened to bio /baɪəʊ/)

In this lesson, you will:

- ✓ listen for specific information
- ✓ listen for gist
- ✓ learn the meaning of new words
- ✓ use new words in context

Prepare for Listening

- 1) Look at the pictures and discuss the questions with a partner. You could start by eliciting the word promotion. Ask a student what rank they are and when they will move to another (higher) rank. Then ask if anyone knows what the word in English is. Get students to discuss the questions in small groups (2 or 3). Monitor and note who gets a good answer. Then, when it comes the time for feedback, ask those students who gave good answers to say it aloud to the rest of the class.
 - a. What is happening in pictures A, B and C? A – a soldier is teaching other soldiers, possibly from overseas. B – this is a promotion ceremony. The two colleagues are changing the rank slide of the person being promoted (in the middle). C – soldiers are doing training at the firing range (marksmanship)
 - b. What is the person's job in picture A? He is a teacher.
 - c. How do military personnel* get these? They have to do something special, like an act of bravery.

* **military personnel** – anyone in uniform who works for the military.
pronunciation: /ˌpɜːsəˈnel/



Listening

2) You will listen to a recording about a ceremony.

- read the questions below
- listen and choose the correct answer (1, 2, or 3) to each question.
- then, compare your answers in small groups

ceremony – a special event to celebrate or mark something important.

pronunciation: /'serəməni/

Make sure students know the meaning of ceremony. Students read the questions first, then listen. Get students to discuss their answers in small groups, then ask a few students to give their answers to the class.

Image 3 shows a typical ritual in a promotion ceremony where the rank slides are changed by the promoted personnel's colleagues (sometimes by their family members as well).

- 3) Listen to the audio again. Fill in the blanks to complete the sentences correctly with the words you hear. Check your answers with a partner after you have finished. Tell students this is the transcript for the audio. Ask them to fill in the gaps as they listen (not after). For feedback, ask each random student to give the answer to the class. If their answer is incorrect, ask another student.

In 2020, LT Smith **deployed** to Iraq on Operation OKRA with Task Group Taji 3 as a training team leader. In this **deployment**, LT Smith conducted Advanced Marksmanship courses, and trained personnel from the Iraqi **infantry**.

In 2023, LT Smith **transferred** to the Royal Australian Army Education **Corps** and **posted** to the Land Warfare Centre – Canungra. There, she started work as an Education Officer. LT Smith’s current **posting** is at the Army Education Centre – South East Queensland.

Her **awards** include the Australian Operational Service **Medal** – Greater Middle East Operation.

Today, LT Smith is **promoted** to the **rank** of Captain.

Learning Military Vocabulary

- 4) The words in bold in the text are important military vocabulary that you should learn to use. Match the military words on the left to their definitions on the right on tables one and two.
- Look at the example. **Note that the word form in the column on the left is as it appears in the text. However, the definition (right hand side column) is written as the base form e.g. joined – to start a new job (not started a new job).**

If students haven't learned passive yet, it's best not to mention this.</i>	e	f. a move to a higher military rank e.g. when an officer moves from the rank of Lieutenant to Captain



For feedback, choose a strong text to display in the screen as an exemplar for the others. It doesn't need to be perfect (and you can correct the mistakes as a class, asking students to help).**
