Vocabulary Builder – Parts of a Tactical Field Kit

TEACHER'S COPY

Overview:

This worksheet lists vocabulary related to items in a tactical field kit.

In this lesson, you will:

- ✓ learn vocabulary for items in a tactical field kit
- ✓ practise using the vocabulary
- ✓ use the vocabulary in speaking activities

Teacher's notes are indicated by this: **TN →**

TN → It is recommended that you teach "What's in your webbing" VB and listening first. That way, students (ss) can use this lesson to practice that vocabulary again as well. For example, in exercise 6.

TN → Before you give students (Ss) the worksheet, play hangman with 'Tactical field kit' on the board. Ask Ss to talk with their partners in English. What do they think a tactical field kit is?

TN → Give Ss a few minutes to complete before comparing with their partners. When Ss are ready, tell them you will play the recording to check. Ss have heard the correct answers (ans) so no need to spend too much time on checking ans here. I recommend the "shout it out" method. Read to the gap and have Ss shout the ans and then keep reading.

1) Complete the description of a tactical field kit with words from the box.

strong // gear // out field // safe // water canteen // first aid kit



What is a tactical field kit?

A tactical field kit has important things soldiers carry when they're ^{a.} out field. It has ^{b.} gear for different jobs. There might be a ^{c.} water canteen for drinking, or a ^{d.} first aid kit for injuries. A tactical field kit needs to be ^{e.} strong and light. Soldiers use these kits to stay ^{f.} safe and complete their missions.

2)  Listen and check.

3) Talk to your friends. Do you have a tactical field kit? What does it have in it?

TN → Give students a few minutes to discuss with their partners to see what words they already know in English. No need to get ans from the class. The Ss will (hopefully) check their understanding of the English words in the next activity.

4) Look at some of the items Australian soldiers often carry in their tactical field kits. Do you know their names in English? Try to match as many items as you can to the words in the box. Continues next page.

TN → Allow the Ss 5 to 10min to complete the activity. When most Ss have completed the activity, ask them to check with their partner. Then move to task 5 to listen, check and drill the correct pronunciation.

5) Listen, check and repeat.

6) Look at the categories for tactical field kit items. Match the items to categories.

- How many more words can you add to each category?

TN → Allow the Ss 10min to do the activity. Encourage Ss to put words in this lesson as well as others that they may know – for example, words from the ‘What’s in the Webbing’ Vocab Builder. Monitor and help Ss with extra words they like and want to put into each category. When time is up, have Ss compare with a partner (a new one if they have been working in pairs already!) and then check ans as a class.

TN → Optional extension. Especially if you are worried that Ss need more support with the words, you could play a guessing game like back to the board, charades or Pictionary (or your own idea!).

7) Speaking – Would you be okay?

TN → Have some Ss read out the instructions. Ask Ss to think of any of ideas apart from the example. For example, “I would use my backpack to make a Hootchie”. Or “I would use the multitool to cut leaves to make a shelter. Make it clear that these can be silly and fun. Give Ss 10min to do the activity encouraging fast finishers to come up with more than one idea. Monitor and listen for good ans. Come together as a class and nominate some Ss to share their ideas.

Look at the example:

It’s time to make camp, but you have lost your hootchie!

I would use my rain jacket and some sticks to make a shelter.

Your turn! You are missing some of your kit! What could you do to survive in the situations in the boxes?

You are hungry but you have lost your ration pack.

You need to find north, but the GPS is broken.

It’s time to sleep, but you have lost your sleeping mat.

Someone has broken their arm, but the first aid kit is missing.

It’s time to move but there is a big hole in the bottom of your backpack.

You need to make a fire, but you don’t have any matches.



TN → You could do this in class if you have time or set it for homework (but don’t forget to check next lesson!). Possible answers: boots, raincoat, webbing, ammunition, backpack, helmet, torch, gun,
